

Jay's Program Celebrates 5 Years of Empowering Individuals with Disabilities

Jay's Program celebrated its five-year anniversary on October 28, 2024, during National Disability Employment Awareness Month. This unique employment initiative offers six-month, part-time paid internships with the County of San Diego, in partnership with PRIDE Industries, San Diego Regional Center, and GT Independence. Jay's Program internships enable people with intellectual and developmental disabilities to enhance their job skills and increase their employment opportunities.

"We know from nearly six decades of experience just how valuable a paid internship can be," said Jeff Dern, President and CEO of PRIDE Industries. "It not only helps the intern gain valuable skills, but it also demonstrates to the employer how capable the potential employee is. So, we were thrilled to team up with San Diego County to support Jay's Program."

Throughout the program, participants engage with County mentors to discuss career goals and tailor their program courses accordingly.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT

Meet Brenda Bello-Vazquez, Cultural Specialist

How long have you been employed at the regional center and what do you do?

I've been at SDRC for over four years. I started off as a Service Coordinator for Unit 33, working with TAY and Adults. After my first year, I transitioned to my current position as the Cultural Specialist. I'm responsible for implementing SDRC's diversity, equity, inclusion, and accessibility projects to ensure that services and supports are culturally relevant and responsive for our clients and families.

Why did you get into this business?

My first job ever was as a direct support staff for a day program. I grew to love the clients and this community as a whole. I saw firsthand the struggles that our non-white, non-English-speaking clients had in participating in their programs, and I wanted to do more to address some of these barriers. Our clients are one of the most disenfranchised populations that have not been fully accepted or integrated into our society. I'm passionate about social justice, so this position seemed like a great opportunity to begin to undo that stigma.

Tell us about one of your best days at work

The most recent was at the PUENTE's IEP Event. My team was told how difficult it is to engage families in Imperial Valley and get them to attend events, particularly in August due to the heat.

We had 18 families show up. Families... not people. Each brought at least one more person, making a total of 64+ participants. This was one of the most successful events I've ever hosted and the families were extremely thankful to finally be connected to someone who can help them better understand IEP's. Shout out to the PUENTE team, I am truly grateful to work with our Promotoras!

Where were you born and raised and how many siblings are in your family?

I was born and raised in Escondido, the 7-6-0! I grew up with two older brothers, two older sisters, and two younger brothers. I'm also an auntie and have two nephews!



What do you like to do in your spare time?

I like arts and crafts, so you will often catch me trying out a new hobby, like making jewelry, diamond paintings, or coloring. I spend a good portion of my time loving on my dog, Maya. I enjoy binge-watching shows, reading, learning new things, and baseball, so you can catch me at Petco Park or at my nephew's Little League games.

What is one of your greatest accomplishments?

Getting my bachelor's in Comparative Ethnic Studies. I'm proud of myself for choosing to study what I'm passionate about instead of your typical degree/career with straightforward career options.

What is the most important characteristic of a good leader?

Resilience. Resilience is the ability to respond adaptively to challenges. It helps the team maintain the emotional strength they need to commit to a shared goal, and the courage to move forward and overcome setbacks. Resilience won't make problems go away, but resilience can help you see past them, find a new path, find ways to enjoy life and better handle stress.

Where do you hope to travel to in the next five years and why?

I want to go to Oaxaca or Colorado. I've traveled a lot all over Mexico but I have yet to go to Oaxaca which has a rich history and strong presence from Indigenous communities. For Colorado,

I want to visit Coors Field and go to a Rockies v. Padres game! At some point I'll visit all the ball parks!

What is the best advice you ever received?

"Rest is a human right, not something to be earned. Exercise your rights." While it started out as advice, it has transformed into a way of being. Some of us are constantly on the go or in survival mode, we have to make time to just be. It's a great reminder to myself to slow down and be mindful of where I am giving my energy.

What do you value in a person most of all?

Accountability. I value people who say they will do something and follow through. It shows integrity and reliability.

What is your favorite quote?

"En nuestra voz irá la voz de los más, de los que nada tienen, de los condenados al silencio y la ignorancia, de los arrojados de su tierra y su historia por la soberanía de los poderosos... Iremos a exigir lo que es derecho y razón de las gentes todas: libertad, justicia, democracia, para todos todo, nada para nosotros" (Comité Clandestino Revolucionario Indígena-Comandancia General del EZLN, 16 de febrero de 1994).

English: "In our voice will be the voice of all, of those who have nothing, of those condemned to silence and ignorance, of those thrown out of their land and their history by the sovereignty of the powerful... We will demand what is right and reasonable of all people: freedom, justice, democracy, everything for everyone, nothing for us."

Tell us one thing people would be surprised to know about you

I'm Mexican Indigenous, Nahua to be specific. My Dad spoke Nahuatl fluently and so do my uncles and aunts. A lot of our older relatives have passed and have taken the language with them, but I am proud to say it is still used by my family members.

I don't speak or understand the language, due to colonization, but the way I connect to my roots is by doing beadwork. I've made earrings, necklaces, wristbands, key chains and more. Beading is very healing for me and for Indigenous peoples. It's more than just a hobby or craft; it's medicine.



I was born in San Diego, but I was raised in Tecate Mexico. Moved back to San Diego 2003 (Junior year in HS). I have two sisters, one older and younger than me.

What do you like to do in your spare time?

On my spare time, I enjoy spending time with my daughters, going out to brunch, or going to the beach. I also enjoy watching 90-day fiancé.

How many kids/grandkids do you have?

I have 2 daughters Anisa (12) and Amina (7)

Jay and Mark were invited to speak to congratulate the graduates and talk about the importance of Jay's Program.



Coursework is just the beginning. Program participants also work with PRIDE Industries' job coaches, who support participants during their internships with practical hands-on coaching, helping them develop the skills needed for success in entry-level civil service jobs. Group meetings, in which interns share their accomplishments and can solicit advice, are held twice a month, ensuring that participants maximize the benefits of the program.

Interns are not the only ones to benefit from Jay's Program. County departments that have participated in the program report that they have experienced many positive benefits and have expanded their perspective on inclusivity and belonging in the workplace.

For these reasons, Jay's Program has enjoyed remarkable success since its inception in 2019. In the 2019-2020 cohort, for example, 19 participants completed the program; three of these individuals secured temporary positions at Covid testing and vaccination sites during the pandemic. Unfortunately, the program was put on hold in 2020-2021 due to the pandemic. However, from 2022 to 2024, 27 participants successfully completed Jay's Program, and 12 were hired as permanent employees. Currently, eight individuals are actively participating in the program, and three graduated on October 25, 2024.

Jay's Program was originally inspired by Raymond G. Bariuan, affectionately known as "Jay." Jay has served as a County Board Office intern since 2019 and has provided vital support and assistance to various legislative teams in both the State Senate and the State Assembly. Currently, he supports County Board Supervisor Tara Lawson-Remer.

Looking ahead, Jay's Program has announced the selection of 10 interns for cohorts 11 and 12, commencing in January and April 2025, respectively. These interns will have the opportunity to gain practical work experience, acquire essential knowledge and skills, and explore entry-level job opportunities within the County of San Diego.

Through intense inpatient physical therapy at the hospital and outpatient physical therapy coordinated by San Diego Regional Center and performed by Dr. Mendonça at NeuroFit Kids, Cora regained significant left hand and left-side torso function, and is continuously improving her left leg's abilities.

Without the San Diego Regional Center, Victoria Vargas, and Dr. Mendonça, Cora would be significantly hindered by her body and constrained when playing with her family and friends.

So, I just want to again express my heartfelt thanks for San Diego Regional Center and what they've enabled my daughter to accomplish.








National Native American Heritage Month

November is **National Native American Heritage Month (NNAHM)** and is a time to celebrate and honor the cultures, traditions, and history of Native American/American Indian (NA/AI) and Alaska Natives'. Throughout our history, Native peoples' cultures, identities, and governments were not always seen as a part of this Nation but as a threat to it. In 1990 congress passed a joint resolution and signed into law that November will be recognized as NNAHM. Today, Native Americans are recognized as the original inhabitants of this land since time immemorial, for their essential contributions to society, and as being integral to the fabric of the United States.

As of 2021 there are 574 federally recognized tribes in the United States, 110 federally recognized tribes in California, and 18 federally recognized tribes in San Diego county. However, numerous others are still advocating for recognition. NNAHM gives us an opportunity to increase our knowledge of the unique challenges tribal communities face and better understand how historical trauma—such as colonization and genocide—has impacted Native peoples.
